Pastor's Message

Grace and peace to you from God our beginning and our savior Jesus Christ,

As December marches on, as the four, blue Sundays of Advent turn to the celebration of the Christmas season, there is a character in the story of God's love whose role is very often overlooked. That person is Mary, the Mother of God.

In the last several centuries we Lutherans have been trying quite hard it seems to distance ourselves from Mary. We rightly feel that we don't need anyone to mediate our relationship with God in Christ. Yes, it's true, our faith does affirm that we need only pray to God. But our discomfort with Mary is not so theological maybe. Maybe it just feels a little unknown.

When we turn to the Lutheran tradition about St. Mary and all the other saints, we read that: "...the saints are to be remembered so that we may strengthen our faith when we see how they experienced grace and how they were helped by faith" (Article XXI of the Augsburg Confession). And further, saints like Mary are to be honored by giving thanks to God for examples of God's mercy, venerated for how God strengthens our faith through them, and imitated for their faith and all their faithful actions (Article XXI of the Apology of the Augsburg Confession). Mary's story is full of humility and strength, faith and faithful actions. The Word took flesh through her not because she was amazing, but because she was small. This is just like how the Word takes flesh in us as we believe, and as the Holy Spirit brings Christ mercy

to life in our own small lives.

Regarding Mary herself, the Apostles and the Nicene creeds confirm that through Mary and the Holy Spirit Christ was indeed made flesh. Our Lutheran tradition also teaches, "...Mary did not conceive and give birth to a child who was merely, purely, simply human, but she gave birth to the true Son of God. Therefore, she is rightly called and truly is the Mother of God" (Epitome, Article VIII of the Formula of Concord).

So, this Advent season we are going to focus a little bit on Mary and the story of the Annunciation in Luke's gospel (Luke 1:26-50). We are not going to pray to Mary, we are going to pray with Mary. In Luke's story we see a beautiful pattern of praying—of trusting in God, and allowing ourselves to be present with God, warts and all. It begins with being perplexed, being troubled and simply waiting in this place of unknowing with God. From there, Mary's story moves to speaking and listening, giving all our thoughts to God in prayer. Next, trusting in God's mercy, we remain still and surrender to God's will. Finally, filled with God's presence we are overcome with joy and adoration, just as Mary sang her song in Luke, traditionally called "The Magnificat."

On the first 4 Thursday nights of December at 7PM all are invited to gather in the sanctuary. We will tell again Mary's part in God's story, read from the Psalms, have some time for discussion, and come before God in prayer. This Advent and Christmas season, let us venerate, imitate and give thanks to God for Mary and all saints. We give thanks to God for all the ways that the Holy Spirit strengthens our faith and reminds us of God's mighty and merciful act of becoming flesh in Christ.

This Christmas, smiles will abound as children across the Greater New Haven area open presents made possible through the Salvation Army’s “Angel Tree” program. Our congregation’s continued support of this program, which provides new clothing and toys for families in need, will be responsible for 10 of those Christmas-morning smiles.

Last year, the Salvation Army served 169 families through this program, providing Christmas presents to 338 area children; our merging congregation supported 10 of those children with gifts. Like last Christmas, we are planning to provide all of the children on our list this year with a gift of clothing plus three additional gift requests. Each gift request—40 in all—was represented by one “Angel Tag” on our “Angel Tree.”

If you didn’t get a chance to sign up for an Angel Tag, it’s not too late to participate in a congregational group gift. Monetary donations are still welcome and will help equip our volunteers with funds for last-minute shopping. Turkeys and Trimmings Help Fill Local Thanksgiving Day Meal Baskets

Nearly 200 pounds of frozen turkeys—13 in all—along with hundreds of pounds of trimmings and other non-perishable food items were transported from Christ the Good Shepherd Lutheran Church to the Hamden Food Bank in November to help fill Thanksgiving Day Food Baskets for local families in need.

Among the items donated from Christ the Good Shepherd were eight bags of potatoes and four boxes of instant potatoes; 16 jars and packets of gravy; 15 boxes and packages of stuffing; 15 boxes of cornbread; seven cans of tomato sauce; and 49 cans of vegetables. An acorn squash, butternut squash, canned yams, cranberry sauce, pasta, rice and assorted cans of fruit were also donated, along with a “side” of personal care items.

According to AnneMarie Karavas, Community Services Program Specialist, the Hamden Food Bank, located at the Keefe Center at 11 Pine Street, provides Thanksgiving meal assistance to more than 500 Hamden families each year with the help of generous donors. She anticipated that as many as 600 families would receive assistance this year.

As the cold weather quickly approaches, we will be resuming a tradition of collecting warm winter-weather wear for those in need.

With the beginning of Advent on November 28, our "Winter Warmth Tree" will be located in the Narthex at Christ the Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. We invite you to help decorate the branches with new cold-weather outerwear, such as hats, gloves, mittens and scarves, as well as with socks, slippers, throws and other items to benefit those served by New Reach Life Haven Shelter, an emergency shelter for single women with children and single pregnant women in their last trimester.

In 2019, our two merging congregations collected 140 warm-winter items for this organization. This year, donations to our Winter Warmth Tree will be delivered to Life Haven in early January.

Property- Council approved a motion to allow an AA group use of our building on Saturday mornings. The facility team prepared a work list (see page 3 for their report.)

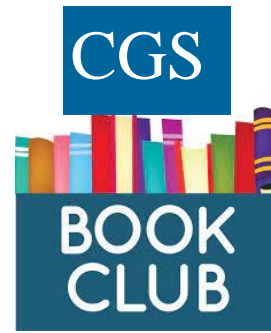
