Pastor's Message

THE REV. JOSHUA SULLIVAN

Grace and peace to you from God our beginning and our ending Jesus Christ,

As the green spring has turned to hot summer here in Hamden, I've been thinking about stewardship.

Stewardship might give some of you memories of pastors begging for money and pledge cards, or bring back the anxiety of budgets in the red. Or it might instead have a pleasant connotation, with memories of big, red cardboard thermometers slowly rising as the generosity of a congregation is stoked to give toward a new project.

Stewardship does mean talking about money. But, of course, stewardship is more. To be a "steward" is to care for that which does not, in the grand scheme of things, belong to us. What an incredibly counter-cultural thing to say: that, in the end, our wealth does not belong to us! And so stewardship is a matter of discipleship, a matter of Spirit, more than merely budgetary anxieties.

Be inspired! Be fearless, despite all the signs of collapse around us. Be of good cheer this summer season, and be generous as God is endlessly generous to us. God's "mission" of loving and redeeming and reshaping the world is always happening, and will never cease. And our giving is just one way we can participate in "the reign of God coming near" (Luke 10:9).

In fact, when they are viewed as followers of Christ, none of those three things which we claim as rights in America—life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness—really *belong to us*. *They are God's gifts to us to be used for the good of others*. Indeed, as we heard Paul preach to the Galatians on Sunday, July 3rd: "So let

us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all..." (Gal 6:9-10).

This July and into August we will hear Jesus preach many times in the Gospel of Luke about the "reign of God"—about stewardship understood in this way.

In the parable of the Good Samaritan Jesus implores us to give our wealth and time to care for the outcast and sick (Luke 10:25-37);

with Mary and Martha we learn that time well stewarded is not all spent not working (Luke 10:38-42);

Jesus tells his disciples our lives are meant for prayer, and from God comes all we need—our daily bread (Luke 11:1-13);

in another parable we are starkly warned that riches will not accompany us past death (Luke 12:13-21);

bluntly we are told to sell all our possessions as alms for the poor (Luke 12:32-40);

and Jesus teaches that, ultimately, all who exalt themselves will be humbled (Luke 14:1, 7-14).

With all these seemingly harsh and heavy teachings, Jesus is truly beckoning us to a free life of joyful giving. Our belonging to God in our baptism, our being made a new creation in Christ, is a gateway to a world of gift. Our lives and our wealth and freedom are all a gift. And just as Christ gave of himself completely on the cross, so are we invited freely to give.

Anyone who wishes to donate toward this project is asked to drop the requested items off in the donation boxes at church for delivery to Hamden Youth Services, 11 Pine Street, prior to the start of the 2022-23 school year.

The city's School Supplies Closet was created to assist Hamden families who are having difficulty providing the items their children need for school. The program is available year-round and is free for qualifying Hamden youth (preschool to college). The communion elements are prepared by our altar guild with masks and gloves. If you are not comfortable removing your mask to receive, come forward with arms crossed for a blessing. *Please wait at the first pew in the center aisle, and allow the person in front of you time to receive both bread and wine before you come forward for bread.*
