Pastor's Message

*Grace and peace to you in the name of Christ
Jesus our Lord,*

February in New England, yuck! It's so cold, rainy, and snowy—nothing but bare trees, brown grass and salty roads. But, you know, as drab as it truly does get, **I really love it!** Maybe it's just because I grew up here in Southern New England and it's what I'm used to... but I think there really is a theological truth to it, a God-logic to drab old February.

Let's admit it—our lives are definitely *not* always sunny. We experience all kinds of hardships and grief. There are times of confusion, times of spiritual dryness when God feels a billion miles away. We mess up and can feel crushed under the pressure of guilt. But isn't it sort of reassuring that Earth, our one and only home, and even Jesus too, goes through this same cycle of life, death and new life? It's not an accident.

February in the Church's calendar certainly gives us both high highs and some real low lows. We begin in the season of Epiphany, the time of lessons from Scripture that show the beginning of Jesus' ministry, his "showing forth, coming to light" (which is what *epiphany* means in Greek) and his teaching us to show forth too—"You are the light of the world," Jesus says. On Transfiguration Sunday, we are actually on a mountain top with Jesus! He shines out to the disciples and refracts the coming glory of his resurrection. But then Lent comes and we sink

back down—we admit we are only dust on Ash Wednesday. On the First Sunday of Lent Matthew's gospel shows Jesus out in the wilderness, himself tempted and pressed down by the weight of the world.

Death and decay and hurt are very real. But they are not *more real* than God. God takes death and decay and hurt and is able to transform even these things. We believe that God in Christ has chosen to make these scary things an integral part of God's story. By the sufferings of Jesus—by his cross and by his tomb—we see that death and dryness and tough times are not cast away forever, but they are part of a cycle. They are part of a process wherein these tough times belong, but do not have the last word.

In the Forty Days of Lent that begins on February 22nd, on Ash Wednesday, we prepare ourselves for Christ's new life by reminding each other of these cycles. The joy of forgiveness comes by first facing repentance. Jesus' resurrection began with betrayal and death. And our own life, death, and new life are each gathered together by Christ in Holy Baptism. There our new life begins again each day by remembering our baptism, by dying to self and rising with Christ all over again.

And so maybe that's why I like this "yucky" Southern New England month of February. It's a reminder of God's promise: to be present in all this, in all things. The bare gray of Winter belongs just as much as the new green of Spring.

We again will be participating in a joint Ash Wednesday worship service with Hamden Plains United Methodist, Mt. Carmel Congregational, Grace & St. John's Episcopal, and Dunbar United Church of Christ at Hamden Plains UM.



Council met 1/18/23.

Pastor reported on the activities during December. We have much to be grateful for! *Worship*— Starr will be writing up a job description for the ushers. Ashes-to-Go is planned as well as a 7:00pm Ash Wednesday service.

Financials— 2022 reports reflect the loss of LCGS parsonage rental income. We have met our Synod pledge. Monies from the sale of LCGS property was transferred to Morgan Stanley financial advisor.

Property— Many upgrades have been completed this past year. Durbin itemized them in his annual report. Fellowship hall walls are being prepped for a fresh coat of paint. An AA group requested use of our facility on Tuesday nights. Council approved expenditure to repair the bottom shelf in the kitchen sink cabinet that sustained water damage.

Outreach—Community Service— JoAnn Isleb brought 7 bags of nonperishable food and personal care items to the Hamden Food Bank. Items from the Winter Warmth Tree (26 winter hats, 14 pairs of socks, 13 pairs of gloves, 12 scarves, 10 pairs of mittens, four throws and two headbands) will be delivered to New Reach Life Haven Shelter. The website continues to generate increased visitors and page views.

Outreach-Special Projects— Leo will assist with Ashes-to-Go again this year and will be helping with scheduling worship assistants and coffee hour. He also wants to volunteer 10 hours a week to the church, from 10-12pm, Monday-Friday. Looking to have CGSL host a blood drive after the fellowship hall upgrades are complete.

Congregational Care— Coffee hour schedule complete through March. Shepherding ministry calls continue to the homebound. Lenten weekly devotions will be in collaboration with Grace & St. John's with details forthcoming. Book Club's next read is The Good Life, by Robert Waldfinger, MD and Marc Shulz, PhD.



Thanks to all who helped decorate our “Winter Warmth Tree” during the 2022 Christmas season with warm winter hats, scarves, mittens and other items to benefit those served by New Reach Life Haven Shelter.

On January 20, Outreach Chair Sharon Napolitano delivered 26 winter hats, 14 pairs of socks, 13 pairs of gloves, 12 scarves, 10 pairs of mittens, four throws and two headbands—81 items in all—to New Reach Life Haven Shelter, an emergency shelter serving single pregnant women and single women with children in the New Haven area.

Last year, our congregation supported New Reach Life Haven Shelter with 74 warm winter items. Thanks to all for their continued support.



Masks optional

In light of the changes in mask policy in the town of Hamden and decreased COVID cases across the state, the congregational council has voted to make masks optional during worship and inside the building.

If you are immuno-compromised, unvaccinated, feeling sick, have been exposed to someone who tested positive, or you yourself have tested positive, or you just are not comfortable worshiping in-person—please join us via Facebook Live! Remember to say “Hi, from so-and-so!” in the comments section so we know who is worshiping with us.

Holy Communion continues.

The communion elements are prepared by our altar guild with masks and gloves. If you are not comfortable removing your mask to receive, come forward with arms crossed for a blessing. *Please wait at the first pew in the center aisle, and allow the person in front of you time to receive both bread and wine before you come forward for bread.*
