Pastor's Message

Grace and peace to you in the name of Christ Jesus our Lord,

It is with great joy that my wife, Madelyn, and I share that we have been blessed by God with another daughter—her name is Lucia. She was born on July 14th! Thank you to everyone who chipped in while I was away on vacation for two weeks to “rest” with my family, and thanks to Calli Micale and Volker Leppin as well who filled in on the two Sundays I was away. (My four weeks of paternity leave I will be taking in the month of October.)

With this new baby around, and with much less sleep than I would like, let me begin this month's reflection by stating the obvious—babies cry... all the time. And this is to say that babies, even from their very first breath, suffer. Even the whole experience of pregnancy, and then labor and delivery certainly, is fraught with great pain, hardship, fear and suffering. And this carries over into being an infant, and then a toddler, and then a teenager, and pretty much stays the case throughout our entire lives. Depressing, right?

So, what do we do about this? More importantly, what does God do about all this suffering? The answers to these questions are found in the ways one cares for an infant. Firstly, babies cry out when they want something. They might not know what they want, but they know they need something. And, as a parent, you listen and try to

provide that need. God, we confess, does this. All our needs and wants are known by God, and God provides for us all that we will ever receive. But first we have to make these needs, this suffering, known. Babies teach us how to pray—loudly and often!

A second lesson is this: sometimes babies just cry, whether they get what they want or not. And we can't always make them stop. A wise person once explained to me that when we hold a baby (or a toddler, or a spouse, or a dying loved one) when they cry, we're not really trying to make them stop but, in fact, we're telling them: “I am here. I am not freaked out by your emotions. You're ok. I am here.” And this, most certainly, is what God does and has done for us. This is who and what Jesus Christ represents.

The Gospel of John tells the story. “In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ... And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. ... Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world but in order that the world might be saved through him.” Jesus becoming flesh, teaching his disciples and walking with his followers until his death and then beyond, is all an image of God's own way of rocking us. God has known suffering in Jesus' crucifixion and death, and God still pours God's own self out in both Word and Sacrament for us.

And through the faith and obedience of Christ's body the Church, God still is very present with the world, through all our wants and in all our suffering.

This is perhaps the most important part of this message. If someone (a baby, a toddler, a spouse, a dying loved one) is in pain and suffering and you simply say to them, "Don't worry, Jesus is with you," that doesn't often do much good. But if you say to *yourself* as you sit with this person, "Jesus is with *me*, and has sent me to be with this person," that hits a little different. We are the ones called to be with, be present to, and to help in alleviating suffering now. God sent Christ, and Christ has sent us, his body, to be *with* the world, through all its great pains, hardships, fears and suffering.

Accepted Back-to-School Items

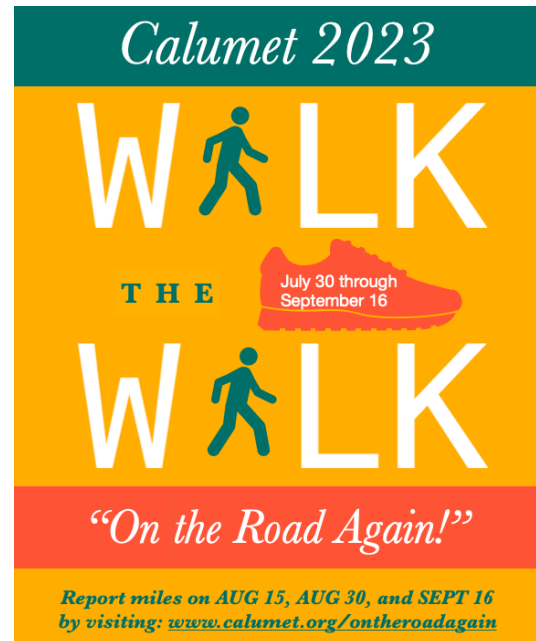
Donations of any of the following new items will be accepted by the “School Supplies Closet” and can be dropped off in the church narthex:

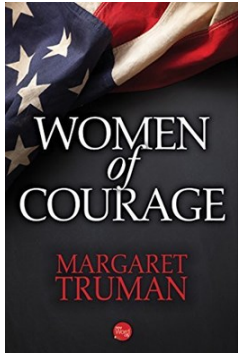
Starting July 30, Calumet Nation will be "On the Road Again!"

Masks optional.

In light of the changes in mask policy in the town of Hamden and decreased COVID cases across the state, the congregational council has voted to make masks optional during worship and inside the building.

If you are immuno-compromised, unvaccinated, feeling sick, have been exposed to someone who tested positive, or you yourself have tested positive, or you just are not comfortable worshipping in-person—please join us via Facebook Live! Remember to say “Hi, from so-and-so!” in the comments section so we know who is worshipping with us.

Holy Communion continues.

The communion elements are prepared by our altar guild with masks and gloves. If you are not comfortable removing your mask to receive, come forward with arms crossed for a blessing. *Please wait at the first pew in the center aisle, and allow the person in front of you time to receive both bread and wine before you come forward for bread.*
