Pastor's Message

THE REV. JOSHUA SULLIVAN

Grace and peace to you in the name of Christ Jesus our Lord,

As I return from parental leave I would like to once again thank you all for including this very important time with my children as part of the compensation for your pastors! I cannot say that it was a relaxing time... but it was a very meaningful four weeks spent caring for my children.

But it was also a stressful time, not because of diapers and naps-gone-wrong, but because, as many of you have already noted, while I was away lots of terrible things have happened in our world. A long-simmering and long-in-the-making conflict in Israel/Palestine, the land that we call holy, has broken out again with distressing bloodshed and hostage-taking and civilian casualties. Yet another mass shooting has taken place in Maine. Refugees are being deported en masse from Pakistan. Political fighting and dysfunction continues here in the United States. Add this all to the ongoing war in Ukraine, and you really have an overwhelming amount of suffering that we are witnessing all around us.

Now, none of this is particularly new. The bible is surely full of this kind of horror. That, of course, doesn't excuse these acts, or make the deaths of little children, regardless of where they live, any less wrong. Certainly, being at home with my two little ones, so fragile, so helpless, it really drives it

home: What, really, stands between my family—your families—and this broken world of sin and suffering? Sadly, nothing. And while I certainly did miss being among you, what I missed the most was experiencing, regularly and together, the promises of God in scripture and in prayer and in relationships. Promises that help us make sense of this kind of suffering.

When we proclaim a crucified God, a God that mysteriously was born into human frailty, we—quite controversially—proclaim a God that suffers. But that's not really it, though. What we proclaim is a **God that loves**. And, as we all probably know, to love is to open oneself to great suffering. It's not that God wanted to be a drama-queen and get nailed to a cross for the sheer pain of it. But, we believe, this was the destined outcome for our God who is love. The embodiment of an infinite love results in infinite openness. Our limited eyes see this as Jesus on the cross.

And that is the challenge of these times. Can we really stop and look? Or do we lay blame for the suffering. "It's their own fault, it's just desserts, etc. etc." We are called to look, and looking, we are called to speak and act. Because just stop and think: why *are* all the atrocities I listed above bad? Why *do* we feel so much when we witness them? After all, why should we care? Because, like God, we, too, have a love for creation. The love of God has been made part of us, part of our calling. We are called to feel deeply, to be opened and transformed by both love and the suffering it creates. Maybe we

do not want to admit it, we hide that love deep down beneath cynicism or despair or political necessity. But I know it still hurts. Because we believe that all of us, as human beings, have been made in God's own image—to love; and as the Church we have been baptized into Christ's own life and death—to proclaim that love.

And as the Church today, with wars raging and refugees fleeing and the planet warming, perhaps our message seems like only a whisper amidst great shouts for power and revenge and justice. And it is a whisper. But, don't forget, Jesus' ministry was only a gentle whisper too. And though it may seem a whisper, this Word of Life that we proclaim is all that we have, and all that we need. For God has proved God's love for us—while we and all people still were yet sinners Christ died for us. This is our image of love we hold on to, showing us that beneath all things is this love.

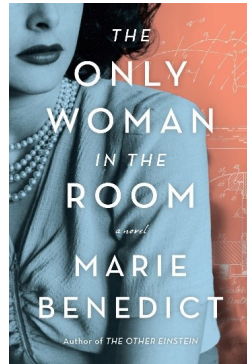
And this love never ends.

Council met 10/25/23.

Worship— Team has been researching new altar cloths— specifically blue and white ones— and presented costs of altar cloths, lectern scarf and chalice veil.

Financials— Year-to-date total contributions are \$16,218 higher than totals in 2022. Office expenses and salaries increased. Rental income and investments help our net income. Ruth started working on the budget for 2024.

Property— Durbin has a list of work to be done. If you see something in need of repair, you can contact him.

Reconciling in Christ— The team needs to meet again.

Outreach-Community— Sharon reported on updating the narthex area. Council approved a motion to allow expenditures up to \$900 for refreshing the narthex with furniture and other accent items. See pages 4 & 5 for upcoming community projects— Thanksgiving Meal Baskets and The Angel Tree. Tanja has been updating the church website with more information about the church and our various ministries.

Outreach-Special Projects— Leo suggested using the income from St. Pauly clothing shed towards our special projects outreach. Council discussed quotes received for an updated sound system for the church. The sound system team (Leo Goodrich, Deb Mason, Rob Hansen and Pastor) will review the quotes in-depth and report back to council in November.

Congregational Care— Book club will meet 12/7. Six women from our church are attending a Women's Retreat at Calumet.

Old Business— Nominating committee is speaking with people to serve on the 2024 council.

New business— Durbin motioned to keep the parish house rental at \$1800/month for one year and council approved. The current occupants have lived there for 10 years.

“Angel Tree” Program to Launch Nov. 19 at Christ the Good Shepherd

As the holiday season quickly approaches, the Salvation Army is once again looking for local “angels” to help provide Christmas gifts for children of families in need through its “Angel Tree” program. The program will get underway at Christ the Good Shepherd Lutheran on Sunday, Nov. 19.



In 2022, the Salvation Army’s “Angel Tree” program served 253 families, supplying Christmas gifts to 567 children in the Greater New Haven area. Our congregation supported 10 of those children with gifts of toys and clothing; in 2023, we plan to increase our support to 12 children.

Like last Christmas, we hope to provide all of the children on our list with four gifts each. Each gift request—48 in all—will be represented by one “Angel Tag” on our “Angel Tree.” Each of those 48 “Angel Tags” will include the child’s age and gender, along with the requested toy or shoe and clothing sizes. Although there is no limit to the amount you may choose to spend per child, the suggested value of each gift is \$15-\$30.

Those interested in shopping for one or more children are invited to select a tag or tags from the tree, which will be set up in the Narthex, and sign their name by the corresponding “Angel” on the signup sheet.

All unwrapped gifts (with “Angel Tags” attached) should be brought to church on Sunday, Dec. 3, where they will be organized and delivered to the Salvation Army in New Haven by Friday, Dec. 8.

Want to avoid the crowds? Monetary donations are also welcome and will enable our designated shopping volunteers to make gift purchases on behalf of the congregation. If you wish to donate by cash or check, please speak with Sharon Napolitano, Outreach Co-Chair.

Help Us Fill Thanksgiving Meal Baskets

Christ the Good Shepherd Lutheran Church will be joining local efforts once again to feed those in need this Thanksgiving by participating in the [Hamden Community Services Thanksgiving Food Drive](#). At Christ the Good Shepherd, we will be collecting frozen turkeys and other holiday fare to help fill the Thanksgiving Meal Baskets Sunday, Nov. 5, through Sunday, Nov. 19.

Last year, we delivered 13 turkeys and 10 bags of trimmings to the Hamden Food Bank in support of this project. In 2022, more than 500 area families were recipients of the Thanksgiving Meal Baskets, and this year the Hamden Food Bank hopes to serve as many as 800 families in need.

Following are the food donations needed:

- * Fresh or frozen turkeys
- * Stuffing
- * Boxed mashed potatoes
- * 5-pound bags of potatoes
- * Yams
- * Rice
- * Jiffy Corn Muffin Mix
- * Turkey gravy
- * Pasta



Please bring all items designated for the Thanksgiving Meal Baskets to church by **Sunday, Nov. 19**, so that the food can be delivered to the Hamden Food Bank at the Keefe Center, 11 Pine Street, on Monday, Nov. 20, for inclusion in this project. Christ the Good Shepherd Community Garden

The first year for the Christ the Good Shepherd community garden has come to an end. Back in May, Christ the Good Shepherd started the community garden as an experiment in partnership with the Town of Hamden and Grace and St. John's Episcopal Church. The garden came together slowly, but by the end of June, it was up and running – thanks to support from the town of Hamden and this congregation. Volunteers from the community and this congregation stepped in throughout the season to help weed, water, harvest, and deliver.

One of the groups that helped with the garden was Girl Scout Troop 60875, who recently began meeting at the church. In mid-September, the girls of this troop spent their meeting time tending to the garden. The tasks that these girls took on included weeding and clearing beds, spreading mulch, and filling beds with soil. The girls enjoyed themselves and were fascinated by the insects and worms in the garden. The troop was also kind enough to donate mulch and soil for the garden!

As of Oct. 29, 111 pounds of produce has been harvested and donated to the Hamden Food Bank. This includes-

- 15 yellow squash
- 13 zucchini
- 9 butternut squash
- 5 cucumbers
- 29 bell peppers
- 18 banana peppers
- 54 grape tomatoes
- 38 full-size tomatoes
- 2 bunches of chard and parsley

This is not a bad start for the first year!

I would like to extend enthusiastic thanks to everyone who helped out with this garden this year.

There are plans to expand the garden for next year, so we could use more help! If you are interested, get in touch with Rob Hansen or any of the members of the outreach committee.
